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Letters From Our Readers

To our friends at the American Bible Society,

The Bible became my life and my anchor. God made it possible for me to study and teach during all the years since God saved me in 1918, when I was nine years old.

God sent my husband and me to northern California in 1934. After some more years of training, [he] sent us to the Redwood Parish and thence to the Hoopa Indian Reservation. Many different tribes were located here together with the Bureau of Indian Affairs and many others.

It was here that we became associated with the American Bible Society and you made it possible for us to give out hundreds of Bibles, because you gave us a special rate and we could do so. . . .

It was fall of one year and we were almost out of Bibles, so I made out a big order to the American Bible Society and told my husband we needed a check for \$160. He said, "We can't send it until we have the money just hold it."

I had not left my desk before a knock came on the front door, and a man, a member of the Hoopa Mission Church, came in and said, "I just sold some cattle and here is my tithe." It was the exact amount that we needed to pay the American Bible Society.

I am still living on the Hoopa Indian Reservation.

Update from around the globe

INTERNATIONAL

A Global Reach

>> The funeral of Pope John II and the inaugural mass of his successor, Pope Benedict XVI, last April turned the eyes of the world toward the Eternal City. The general secretary of the Bible Society in Italy, Dr. Valdo Bertalot, occupied privileged positions at both of these events - a sign of the healthy standing of the Bible Society in Italy with the Vatican.

In 1968, soon after the Catholic Church presented the Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation, better known as Dei Verbum, the United Bible Societies welcomed a new era of collaboration. They published Guiding Principles for Interconfessional Cooperation in Translating the Bible, which led to interconfessional translations and Bible Societies in Italy, Africa, the Americas, Asia-Pacific and the Middle East - giving God's Word the widest possible reach through today's media and in today's language.

Refugee Highway

>> When fleeing Africans make the arduous journey to Europe, what they need more than anything else is positive human contact, according to Dr. Graham Hutt, a consultant for the United Bible Societies (UBS).

Many of them spend months on foot or in overcrowded trucks, traveling across thousands of miles of desert, only to find themselves in legal limbo when they arrive. An aid worker cited the example of Sahro, a 28-year-old migrant from Somalia now living in Rome, a hospitable city where thousands of people wait to process their applications for asylum. Sahro's

daughter was born prematurely on the journey, and the only "permanent" shelter Sahro has had for the past four years is a chair in the hospital next to her daughter's bed. Missions, churches and UBS are ministering to migrants like Sahro, offering help and hope through Scriptures in appropriate languages.

NATIONAL

Teaching Lectio Divina

>> The ancient practice of slow, contemplative praying of the Scriptures, called Lectio Diving in Latin, enables the Word to become a means of union with God. This ancient practice has been kept alive in the Christian monastic tradition. Now, the American Bible Society has created a training manual called Encuentro con la Biblia (Encounter with the Bible) in Spanish and English to help implement the Lectio Divina method in Catholic dioceses, especially those with Latino/ Hispanic populations.

Melvin Rivera, former director of Latino ministries at the Bible Society, says, "Pope Benedict XVI has recommended that Catholics place a fresh emphasis on the regular reading of the Sacred Scriptures, accompanied by prayer. This enables an intimate dialogue in which, through reading, we hear God speak, and through prayer, we respond with a trusting openness of heart. If this practice is effectively encouraged, I am convinced that it will produce a spiritual springtime in the church."

So far, some 25 parishes in California, Florida, New York, Oklahoma and Texas have participated in one-week introductory sessions to the Lectio Divina approach to Bible study.


Both organizations are eager to renew and expand the collaboration. "It is great for Habitat to be partnering once

OUR LIBRARY SERVICES SUPERVISOR JACOUELYN SAPIJE ANSWERS YOUR QUESTIONS ABOUT THE BIBLE.



What is the dollar equivalent of one shekel in the Bible?

Before the use of coins silver and gold were weighed on scales. Silver became the most common medium of exchange in early Old Testament times. The different values of money used in the Bible - the talent, shekel, mina and gerah - refer to units of weight.

In Old Testament times, a shekel was

approximately 14.5 grams (0.5 ounces) of silver. In the days of the New Testament, it was a common silver coin of the same weight.

Coins were invented at about 600 B.C. and were first used in the Persian Empire. The daric, or "dram," named for the

Persian King Darius I, was known to the Jews in exile (Ezra 2.69; 8.27 and Nehemiah 7.70-71, KJV).

It is impossible to estimate in modern terms the value of these ancient coins. The King James translators used terms such as "farthing" to provide readers with a familiar reference for the small value of the widow's mite in the above passages. The term "penny" (Mark 12.41, GNT) was used for the silver denarius, which represented a day's wages in New Testament times. The mite was worth about a tenth of a cent (Mark 12.42, NIV). With the passage of time these terms have lost their point of reference.

In John 4, Jesus traveled from Judea to Galilee by way of Samaria. How far is it and how long did it take?

The journey from Jerusalem in Judea to Tiberias on the Sea of Galilee via Samaria is 70 miles. Travel on land was similar in Old and New Testament times. Officials with permits and couriers used the courier system: horses,

> carriages and resting places with fresh horses. But most travelers went on foot.

> A normal distance traveled by foot in one day would be 16 Roman miles. A Roman mile equaled 1,000 double steps, and a double step

was equivalent to two strides by a Roman soldier (approximately 2.4 feet).

How many Gutenberg Bibles were printed?

The Gutenberg Bibles were printed from 1455 to 1456 and each was bound in two volumes. They are large books, measuring 151/2 x 111/8 inches. It is thought that 150 copies were printed on paper and about 35 on parchment (vellum). About 36 paper and 12 parchment copies of the original Gutenberg Bible survive in rare-book libraries in cities as diverse as Mainz, Germany; Tokyo; and New York and Austin here in the United States.

Many Years, One Message

his year, the American Bible Society celebrates 190 years of serving a single mission: providing Scriptures in formats and languages so that all people may experience the Bible's life-changing message. As the countdown to our bicentennial begins, we take a look back at some memorable dates in Bible Society history.

The Bible Society introduces a

finger-operated phonograph — a "Finger Fono" - to bring the

Scriptures to those who don't read.

The American Bible Society is founded in New York City. Elias Boudinot, the former president of the Continental Congress and director of the U.S. Mint, is elected its first president. In its first full year of operation, the Society distributes 17,594 Bibles.

The first publication by the Bible Society in another language is the Delaware Indian/ English parallel text of the three Epistles of John, translated by Christian Frederick Dencke.

"The Bible is the repository of the moral and religious teachings of our Western tradition. It is a book not for a day or a week but for eternity." - U.S. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. LETTER TO THE BIBLE SOCIETY (1942)

Bible Sunday is first celebrated in conjunction with the Panama-Pacific Exposition. It continues to the present day under Bible Society sponsorship.

1957

Helen Keller speaks at the Bible Society Centennial Year of Service to the Blind: "I cannot recall a furtherreaching benefit to the blind, unless it be education itself." The American Bible Society has Helen Keller's 13-volume Braille Bible in its collections.





Make a Joyful Noise

A new Bible translation revives a language as rich as America.

ullah Heritage Days are a feast for the senses. On the second weekend of every November, visitors to St. Helena Island, just off the coast of South Carolina, come home to the smells of savory red rice and deviled crabs, and the sound of gospel singing. But in 2005 the festival had something more to offer than food and high spirits - something for the heart.

Pride of place was given to the dedication of De Nyew Testament, a translation of the New Testament into Gullah, a labor of love 26 years in the making. Emory Campbell, who worked on the translation team, remembers standing on the stage and listening to John's Gospel sounding from the festival loudspeakers last November, to loud choruses of "Amen" from the crowd. That moment, he says, "brought out the meaning of the Bible as well as the meaning of our ancestry."

A HIDDEN TREASURE

Gullah culture is as rich as America. It is the product of Africans from many nations who were brought to the isolated coastal area to work as slaves on the indigo, cotton and rice plantations. The displaced people created the Gullah (or "Geechee") language as a way to communicate with one another, and isolated geography has preserved pieces of their African culture through the centuries.

Penn Center is an organization working to preserve that culture. Deloris Pringle, the immediate past chair of its board of trustees, calls Gullah a "hidden treasure" for African Americans, a link to a forgotten past. "There is something about the language of your foreparents handed down that is central to knowing who you are" - something, she says, African Americans have not had.

"Our hope is that this New Testament will help keep the Gullah language and culture living and active among future generations," says Dr. Steve Berneking, senior translations officer for the American Bible Society. "It cuts across the years and shows the rich and deep history of who these people are." (CONTINUED PAGE 10)

Gullah is one of seven Bible translation projects in North America in which the Bible Society is involved, according to Dr. Berneking. It is the mission of the Bible Society to provide Scriptures for language groups that want to read God's Word in their heart language. In cooperation with the United Bible Societies, the American Bible Society provided accuracy checking for De Nyew Testament and the printing and distribution of the final Scriptures, and funding to keep the project alive.

It's hard to imagine a project more warmly welcomed. Gullah culture is deeply Christian - the songs "Michael Row the Boat Ashore" and "Kumbayah" ("Come by Here") are Gullah through and through — but locals had never before been able to read God's Word in their own language.

THE WORD COMES HOME

Pat and Claude Sharpe came to the region in 1979, under the sponsorship of the Wycliffe Bible Translators. In finding a team of translators, the Sharpes learned that half their battle lay in convincing islanders there was something

genuinely worth saving in Gullah - which local schools had long tried to teach children to abandon as "broken English."

Mr. Campbell remembers being skeptical at first, but Pat Sharpe was persistent. "She patiently showed me the history of Gullah, how it came through the Caribbean, and before that, from Africa," says Mr. Campbell. After about "two years of denial," Mr. Campbell joined the project after he became the executive director of Penn Center.

Pat Sharpe passed away in 2002, and Wycliffe translation consultants David and Lynn Frank

stepped in to shepherd the project to completion. One of the memorable discussions for David Frank concerned Matthew 5.3, when the team worked on the phrase "blessed are the poor in spirit," which has no Gullah equivalent. They decided on "Dey bless fa true, dem people wa ain hab no hope een deyself, cause God da

> rule oba um." Literally, "they are truly blessed, those people who have no hope in themselves, because God is ruling over them."

> As the translation wrapped up, the Bible Society published and helped to distribute the Bible. To help get the word out, Dr. Frank gave a class on Gullah Bible translation through Penn Center. One of the star students was Mary Ravenell, daughter of a Pentecostal bishop, who had learned Gullah at her grandmother's knee.

> Ms. Ravenell was asked to appear on camera reading the beatitudes in Gullah, and became one of the

spokespeople for the Gullah Bible. She now gives presentations to churches, schools and retirement homes, and her goal is to personally present De Nyew Testament to President Bush.

The Gullah Bible has attracted international media attention, and later this year academic seminars and gatherings for ministers will study it closely. For Ms. Ravenell, it's about time. "This Bible inspires me to promote fellowship wherever I go - to be a bridge for people of all ages," she says with a smile in her voice. "God's will is really happening."





The Call of God and Country

Carrying the gospel to the front lines

Readers may remember "Immersed in the River of Life: A Wartime Victory," from the Fall/Winter 2005 issue. This article gives a bigger picture of Chaplain Brian Waite's ministry.

n the military, they call a soldier's first experience of combat his "baptism under fire" - where the challenge is to function effectively in a new and threatening environment. For Chaplain Brian Waite, this experience of a baptism under fire became a literal reality in the sands of Iraq.

The Rev. Waite stands a slender six-foot-seven, with a ready and reassuring smile. He confesses

that he grew up a "typical un-churched cultural Christian" until his "surrogate father," a man named Sam Castle, was stricken with cancer. The man told the wide-eyed boy that he needed to give Jesus a try. His first taste of faith, taken on his 16th birthday in 1981, set him off on a life-shaping adventure.

The road to Iraq was one of extensive preparation: a B.A. in biblical studies, an M.Div. in biblical languages, an M.B.A. in

international relations, a D.Min. in religious studies, and a Ph.D. in historical theology. While at The Criswell College, he developed an interest in the military, and at Southwestern Baptist Seminary he enrolled as a candidate for the Navy chaplaincy.

His commission as a Navy chaplain in 1992 was short-lived; after four years he left active duty to pastor a 3,600-member congregation in Oklahoma City. It was also during this sabbatical from military service that he learned his mother was terminally ill.

Following the attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, Rev. Waite felt a call to return to the Navy. His assignment to the 2D Marine Division at Camp Lejeune,

N.C., meant a move for his wife, Kathy, and their two teenage boys, Nicholas and Michael. Once at Camp Lejeune, he was assigned to a reconnaissance battalion. The chaplain felt seasoned by his previous military and pastoral experiences. His maturity was noticed and he was soon named deputy division chaplain.

He recalls the many late nights and early mornings when he and the division chaplain visited staging areas where soldiers and their families

gathered, waiting for the buses that would take wives and husbands, mothers and fathers, off to war. He knew that some of the goodbyes would be for a lifetime.

Then, with only 48 hours' notice, Rev. Waite's turn came. When two chaplains already at sea and en route to the Middle East lost the confidence of their commanding officers, they were fired. Rev. Waite was assigned to help fill the vacant positions.

LEAVING FOR IRAO

The memories of pain and pandemonium are still vivid. "Leaving [my] wife and children on such short notice, making sure my will was in place, going over details of what to do should I die, saying goodbye, taking photos knowing this was it - there's no way to prepare for that," he says.

As Rev. Waite said his goodbyes to his family in the parking lot, two busloads of Marines watched. How would this man of faith handle himself? His baptism under fire had begun.

He was the last one to board the bus and he could feel the tension. As he stood in the aisle, this man of the cloth quipped, "I hope this is the bus to Rome." His humor broke the tension. They were off to Kuwait via Frankfurt.

During the ensuing weeks of desert training, the chaplain noticed a different kind of connection with "his boys" - an intimacy of compassion he had not felt in his earlier stint as a chaplain. Says Rev. Waite, "I saw the face of my two sons in each one of these soldiers."

THE RIVER OF LIFE In Iraq, Rev. Waite baptizes one of the many Marines who came to Christ during a harrowing tour of duty.

He spent his time connecting with them, discussing the moral issues of combat, giving out Bibles provided by the American Bible Society. He found that the worship services he held were better attended than ever. He felt empowered by his commanding officer, Lt. Col. Brent Dunahoe, to be a chaplain to the troops and to deal with real issues. When he and the colonel first met, the colonel told Rev. Waite, "Take care of my boys." His response was, "They're mine as well, sir."

When the day came to go to war, Lt. Col. Dunahoe gathered the battalion and gave a charge to his troops, then yelled, "Padre up!" which was Waite's cue to lead them in prayer. It was a solemn moment — "Ash Wednesday," recalls the chaplain. Some Marines went down on one knee. Some crossed themselves. They all bowed their heads. A multitude of amens followed.

They crossed the Line of Departure (LOD) into Iraq on March 19, 2003. "We were nonmechanized combat infantry," says Rev. Waite. "Ground-pounders, grunts.

What you can't carry, you don't take." With the logistics of supply always a challenge, having enough Bibles was a concern. So. before departure, he dumped all the personal gear from his pack and stuffed it with small military Bibles from the Bible Society. Equipped with those and a Communion kit clipped to his belt, he headed into battle.

BIBLES ON THE FRONT LINE

During this time, he says, "I gave out so many Bibles I couldn't even hold on to my personal copy. It was humbling to discover how much of the Word I'd ingrained into my heart." He held services every night: simple Bible studies, sharing the Word, praying, serving Communion. "Guys would come out of the woodwork just to observe."

They took their first casualties in the suburbs of An Nasiriyah, a city about two-thirds of the way to Baghdad from the LOD.

"It was intense. Soldiers killed or wounded in action, small-arms fire, mortars, the world falling down around you. During periods of

devotional guide and a copy of "Would You Like to Know God Personally?" packaged in a waterproof bag made to fit into a uniform pocket.

Military Ministry has distributed more than 1 million RDKs, and requests for more from chaplains and commanders average about 25,000 per month.

One military chaplain comments, "I have been an active chaplain for 14 years and I know from the bottom of my heart [that] deployment kit is the best religious resource out there."

lull in the fighting, I'd pass out Bibles. Marines would read the Word of God, devour it. At night, kids would come, wake me to read the Bible. We'd pray together. I was conducting six to 18 services a week. According to Lt. Col. Dunahoe, 'Every day is Sunday when you're in a fight.' I found I had a surreal opportunity: four months of preaching and teaching when guys are most open."

The payoff came a few days before Easter.

I gave out so many Bibles I couldn't even hold on to my personal copy. It was humbling to discover how much of the Word I'd ingrained into my heart.

"Three or four Marines approached me and asked to be baptized," says the veteran chaplain. "I told them, first they needed to fully understand what being baptized meant, how it was an act of faith."

He set up baptism classes for the coming week and a half, and suggested that the soldiers invite others. After the classes, if they still wanted to, he'd make the complicated security arrangements. For the first class, 77 Marines showed up. By the end, an impressive 60 remained.

On Easter Sunday, 44 Marines were baptized in the Tigris River — which in Arabic means

"river of life." Another 16 soldiers were baptized over the next two days.

A combat correspondent who photographed the Easter baptism asked, much like the Ethiopian in the book of Acts, if Rev. Waite could explain what it all meant.

"I shared with him from an American Bible Society Bible about this sacred rite," says Rev. Waite. "The photographer responded, 'I'd like to be a follower of Jesus.' We baptized him that day."

"It was the power of the Word of God that brought them; it has a power unto itself," he says.

artha Evans Sparks dedicates her fourth book to "the memory of Bertel Milas Sparks, lawyer, teacher, Christian gentleman, and my husband." Strength for Today: Daily Encouragement Through Life's Transitions (2005, Wesleyan Publishing House) is her third book since "Bert" passed away in 1994. They were all inspired by the intensive care she was called to give during the five years before he went

home to the Lord. She has been dubbed "America's voice of the caregiver," and though the books were born of the personal journey Martha made, they minister to other caregivers who find themselves in times of challenge and transition.

A treasury from Bert's heart inspired Martha to begin writing. Little did she know that during the 42 years of their marriage, Bert had been writing short prayers, neatly typed on 3-by-5-inch cards. Upon his passing, Martha discovered two long steel file drawers containing a total of 1,000 prayers. In Strength for Today, each of Martha's Scripturebased devotions is punctuated by one of Bert's straightforward prayers.

Martha and her publisher agree that this project has been "a God thing." She says, "Arguably, loss is the most common of human experiences. We lose our parents, our spouse, our health . . . and we have to go on."

Where does the strength to face this come from? Martha says, "Bert and I believed deeply in the Bible - that 'all Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching" (2 Timothy 3.16, NIV). They taught Bible studies at Sunday school for many years. Martha says she "never gets through being amazed how God is interested in the details of our lives." Proof of

> the inspiration of the Bible, she says, is in the way Scripture continues to grow and deepen in us over time that we can never come to the end of its riches.

> It makes sense that Martha would consider leaving her estate to the American Bible Society. She feels that the mission of the American Bible Society is doctrinally sound and embraces the most important tenets of the Christian faith - and that her bequest is a rare opportunity to uphold and support the core beliefs and values that she and Bert shared for so many years.
